## NOTICE UNDER SECTION 38 OF THE ROAD TRAFFIC ACT 1994 (AS AMENDED)

## SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL – BISHOPSTOWN COMMUNITY SCHOOL

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 38 of the Road Traffic Act 1994 (as amended), Cork City Council hereby gives notice of its intention to carry out various safety improvement measures to improve pedestrian and cycling infrastructure and the front of school environment at Bishopstown Community School, Westgate/Melbourn Road, Bishopstown as part of the Safe Routes to School programme.

The main features of the proposed works are as follows:

- Upgrade of the existing controlled crossing on Melbourn Road to that of a toucan crossing, including associated works to connect the existing cycle lanes.
- The provision of raised continuous footpaths across vehicular entrances to highlight pedestrian priority at the Front of School area.
- The provision of uncontrolled courtesy crossings at junctions along the desire lines for pedestrian traffic.
- Junction tightening at proposed areas for uncontrolled crossings along Westgate Road.
- The provision of advanced warning signage, road markings and high friction coloured surfacing, on the approach to the Front of School Gateways, on Melbourn and Westgate Road, as a means of calming traffic in the interest of cyclist and pedestrian safety.
- The provision of build outs to facilitate traffic calming.
- Other necessary associated ancillary works.

In accordance with the Habitats Directive, an Appropriate Assessment (AA) Screening has been carried out on the proposed scheme, in relation to any potential impacts upon the Cork Harbour Special Protection Area [Site No. 004030] and the Great Island Channel Special Area of Conservation [Site No. 001058]. The findings of the AA screening noted that no significant effects on any Natura 2000 sites are likely, and it was not necessary to undertake any further stage of the Appropriate Assessment process. In addition, the proposed scheme has been screened to determine whether an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) is required, and it has been concluded that there will be no real likelihood of significant effects on the environment arising from the proposed scheme and that an EIA is not required.

Accordingly, they will be included in the minutes of that meeting and may appear in the

public domain. Cork City Council will retain data for no longer than is necessary and in accordance with the Council's Retention Policy and relevant Data Protection legislation.
